2. Erosion of Traditional Practices

- The Halakki community is known for its rich oral traditions, folk songs, and rituals. However, these are gradually diminishing due to the influence of mainstream culture.
- Traditional dress, like sarees without blouses for women and ornaments made of natural materials, is now being replaced by modern attire.

- Despite their unique culture, the Halakki Vokkaligas are not officially classified as a Scheduled Tribe (ST), which limits their access to various benefits and protections provided to tribal communities.
- Social activists from within the community have been advocating for their inclusion in the ST list to ensure better access to education, employment, and healthcare.

- Traditionally dependent on agriculture and forest produce, many Halakki families face challenges due to shrinking forest resources, land encroachments, and environmental degradation.
- The lack of secure land ownership has made them vulnerable to exploitation and displacement.

- NGOs and local organizations have been working to document and preserve Halakki traditions, including their songs, stories, and rituals.
- Cultural festivals and exhibitions showcasing their heritage are being organized to create awareness and promote pride in their identity.
