The status of women in Sub-Saharan Africa varies significantly, from country to country and within different communities in the region.

Education of women in this region has historically faced various challenges but there have been significant improvements in recent years. In recent years, concerted efforts by Government, NGOs, and international organizations have focused on improving access to education for girls in Sub-Saharan Africa. Education, as conceptualized by Freire, is deeply embedded in the dialogic sense of an educational paradigm that is anchored in a problem-posing understanding of the act of knowledge acquisition and the intentionality behind world alteration. It represents a form of education that incites transformation, emancipation, and the liberation of humanity(Siqueria, 2015).

Education being a platform for career-oriented futures should be acknowledged as one of the critical instruments for driving societal change. Likewise, it is also vital for foundation of democracy (Singh and Singh, 2017).

OBJECTIVES:

HYPOTHESIS: The present study will test the following null hypotheses:

Ho: Educational attainment of women does not have any impact on women empowerment.

RESEARCH METHODOLOGY:

The research methodology has been structured to provide a systematic and rigorous analysis of the impact of female literacy on the female population shedding light on the challenges and opportunities for enhancing gender equality and development in the region. Quantitative research design has been adopted to analyse cross sectional data which have been collected from secondary sources, mainly from the UNDP websites and their reports. The present research focuses on representative samples of Sub-Saharan Africa to ensure a broader perspective. Criteria for selecting countries include factors such as education level, gender inequality indices, economic status and cultural contexts. Key variables that have been considered in the analysis include educational attainment levels among women,

employment rates, income levels, participation in decision making process, access to healthcare and general well-being indicators.

The Model: Following model is constructed for exploring the relationships:

$$WEI = \alpha + \beta_1(FMYS) + \beta_2(FEYS) + U$$

Where,

WEI = Women Empowerment Index

FMYS = Female Mean Years of Schooling

FEYS = Female Expected Years of Schooling

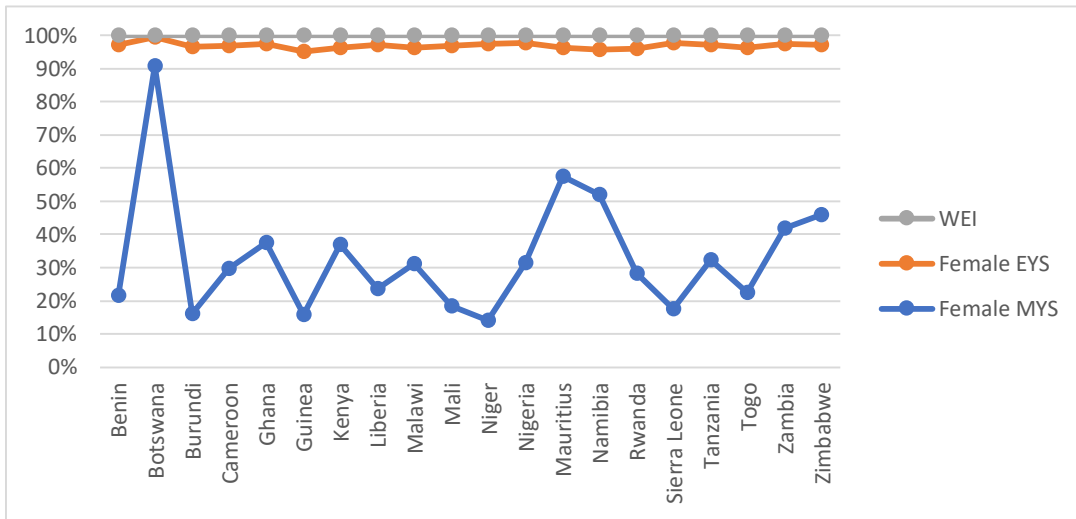
DATA ANALYSIS & INTERPRETATIONS:

The statistical data contained in the Table-1 is an overview of status of female education in the Sub-Saharan countries of Africa which have been selected for the study. The three critical indices FMYS, FEYS and WEI varies from country to country. Botswana is showing highest MYS value of 10.3 which indicates that the women of the country have better access to education in comparison to other remaining countries of the region. On the other hand, countries like Niger and Guinea have significantly lower MYS value for women indicating prevalence of barriers to attainment of education. In Sierra Leone, future educational prospect of girls is bright as indicated by the EYS score. On the other hand, Namibia’s EYS is very low. Countries such as Niger, Guinea, etc. are having comparatively low WEI.

The Box-I, Box-II and Box-III containing 20 observation data set reveal the following results.

- The constat is 0.441. The value of the constant is thus significant (p -value $<$.001).
- The first independent variable value is 0.619. It clearly indicates that it has strong positive impact on the model. The relationship has been found to be statistically significant with a p -value of 0.004
- The second independent variable of the model is -0.005. However, the result is statistically insignificant. So, it cannot be asserted that it has any real effect on WEI in the model.
- The overall significance of the model was also tested using an ANOVA. The results show that the regression model is statistically significant with an F-value of 6.664 and a p -value of 0.007
- This significant F-test suggests that the combination of the independent variables is a valid predictor of the dependent variable.
- The R value is 0.663 which is indicating strong positive correlation.
- R² value of 0.374 is indicating that after accounting for the number of predictors, approximately 37.4% of the variation in WEI is attributed to FEYS and FMYS.

From the above statistical interpretations, it can be asserted that the overall the constructed model is useful, but its main predictive power is driven only by the value of FMYS. **We can confidently state that a higher MYS of women is positively associated with a higher WEI. But,**

at the same time it is almost found in the data set that FEYS does not have much significant impact in the model.

Thus, the estimated model is-

$$\text{WEI} = 0.441 + 0.019(\text{FMYS}) - 0.005(\text{FESY})$$

FUTURE DIRECTIONS FOR RESEARCH

While this research paper focuses on the importance of education in empowerment of female population in the Sub-Saharan region of Africa, there are several avenues for further research in this area. Future studies may be conducted to find the long-term effects of provision of education for the female population on economic empowerment, political participation and social mobility. Additionally, comparative studies across different regions in Sub-Saharan Africa could provide insights into the effectiveness of various education policies and programs in promoting women's empowerment.

Moreover, research could examine the intersectionality of gender with other social factors such as class, ethnicity, geographical location in influencing women's access to education. Further analysis of intersectional dynamics may also be a critical area of thinking for addressing the inimitable challenges faced by marginalized women. Findings of this study have substantial implications for formulation of policy in This region. Governments and policymakers should prioritize investments in education, particularly for girls and women, to address the existing disparities and promote women's empowerment. This may involve initiatives such as building more schools, providing scholarships and incentives for girls and implementing gender-sensitive curricula to ensure that girls have equal opportunities to access quality education as like as boys.

Furthermore, promoting women's empowerment through education requires a multi-sectoral approach involving collaboration between government activities, NGOs specially involved in this domain and international partners. By working together, these stakeholders can develop comprehensive strategies to tackle barriers to women's education, such as early marriage, gender-based violence and lack of resources.
