

ADMINISTRATIVE INSTITUTIONS AND ELECTORAL INTEGRITY IN INDIA

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Abstract: Electoral integrity is fundamental to democratic governance, as it ensures that elections are conducted in a free, fair, transparent, and impartial manner. In India, the preservation of electoral integrity depends not only on constitutional and legal safeguards but also on the effective functioning of administrative institutions responsible for election management (Seth, 2025). The Election Commission of India (ECI), supported by state, the district election officers and the law enforcing authorities, plays a central role in translating constitutional principles into electoral practice (Malik, 2025).

This paper examines the role of administrative institutions in safeguarding electoral integrity in India, with particular emphasis on institutional independence, administrative neutrality, and enforcement mechanisms such as the Model Code of Conduct (MCC). Adopting a qualitative and doctrinal approach, the study analyses constitutional provisions, election laws, judicial interpretations, and official guidelines governing election administration (Election Commission of India [ECI], 2024). It identifies key challenges, including political pressure, uneven enforcement of electoral norms, and capacity constraints, which affect the credibility of election administration (Arshad et al., 2025). The paper argues that the legitimacy of elections in India is closely linked to the autonomy, accountability, and effectiveness of administrative institutions and underscores the need for consistent institutional strengthening to sustain public trust in the democratic process.

CONCEPTUAL FRAMEWORK AND INSTITUTIONAL STRUCTURE

Electoral integrity provides a normative framework for democratic elections that measures the extent to which:

- elections are conducted fairly and openly

- figures and institutions do not skew lists of eligible voters or count results in biased way, and
- final counts draw on an informed electorate.

One of main problems is political pressure on polling officers, mostly at state or district level. Institutional control by ECI, judicial observation to election decisions, and media or civil society's monitoring as well are functioning as checks on any excess or administrative not working well. Court actions have made ECI have more authority to pass orders to ensure elections are free or fair, mostly where there are not enough law rules for that (Malik, 2025).

To sum up, although problems for electoral integrity are continuing, oversight measures are giving strong structure to the institutions. It is very important to make these mechanisms stronger and have them used consistently to keep trust of people in electoral procedure.

CONCLUSION AND RECOMMENDATIONS

- **Build Capacity:** Officials of elections need to get more training and more resources on regular schedule for dealing with new problems, especially related of technology and in media.

- Implement MCC Consistently: Fair and on time using Model Code of Conduct is necessary for keeping equal ground and peoples' confidence onto elections administration.
- Improve Transparency with Accountability: Grievance redressal should be stronger and communication by election management must be improved, so electoral credibility is further made better.

More strength of institutions is vital, so elections is not only just according to legal expectation, but also so it creates people's trust and democracy acceptance.

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
