The policy also highlights inclusive education, teacher training in socio-emotional support, life skills education, and counseling systems in schools and higher education institutions. By integrating mental health with educational reform, NEP 2020 aims to create safe, supportive, and nurturing learning environments that foster both academic excellence and psychological well-being.

In extreme cases, this stress has contributed to rising instances of depression and student suicides, signaling an urgent need for systemic reforms. One of the fundamental shifts introduced by NEP 2020 is the transition from rote-based learning to a competency-based, experiential, and multidisciplinary approach. Objective Of the Study

1. To study the key provisions related to mental health care in NEP 2020.

Literature Review

The National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 emphasizes the integration of mental health care in schools to promote students' holistic development and well-being. It advocates for integrated support services, including COUNSELLING, to address socio-emotional and academic needs (Kumar, 2020). The policy highlights early identification and intervention for mental health issues, regular mental health check-ups, and maintaining health cards for students (Kumar, 2020). Training teachers, counselors, and school personnel in mental health support is a key aspect, with recommendations for incorporating mental health modules into teacher education (Kumar, 2020). Collaboration with external agencies, such as mental health professionals, is encouraged to provide comprehensive support (Kumar, 2020). The prevalence of anxiety among Indian school children, reported at 35.66%, particularly during COVID-19, underscores the need for school-based interventions (Muthusamy et al., 2022). Gender disparities in mental health issues indicate the necessity of gender-sensitive programs (Muthusamy et al., 2022). The role of school counselors in providing timely interventions is crucial (Patnaik & Nebhinani, 2020). Government initiatives like Manodarpan and the KIRAN helpline aim to offer psychosocial support and suicide prevention services (Sattva Consulting, 2023; Agrawal, 2020). The Mental Healthcare Act 2017 aligns with NEP 2020 by emphasizing the rights of individuals with mental illness and ensuring access to mental healthcare (Government of India, 2017). The COVID-19 pandemic highlighted educational inequalities, reinforcing the need for robust mental health systems in schools (Longfield, 2025). However, challenges such as a lack of trained personnel and resources hinder effective implementation (Patnaik & Nebhinani, 2020). Future school mental health programs in India should adopt a comprehensive, intersectoral approach, aligning with NEP 2020's vision for holistic well-being (Kumar et al., 2015).

Key Provisions Related to Mental Health in The Nep 2020

1. Awareness and Sensitization

NEP 2020 emphasizes creating awareness about mental health among students, teachers, and parents. It calls for sensitization programs to address stigma, misconceptions, and discrimination associated with mental health issues. The policy highlights the development of critical life skills, stating:

“Critical life skills (including financial literacy, digital literacy, commercial skills, health care and awareness, child care and education, and family welfare)” (NEP 2020).

Such initiatives promote mental health literacy and foster a supportive school culture.

2. Establishment of Counselling Services

The policy recommends setting up counselling systems in all educational institutions to provide emotional guidance and psychological support to students. It clearly states:

“In every educational institution, there shall be counselling systems for handling stress and emotional adjustments” (NEP 2020).

This provision ensures early identification and intervention for students experiencing stress, anxiety, or emotional difficulties.

3. Inclusion of Mental Health in Curriculum

NEP 2020 advocates incorporating health and mental well-being into the curriculum to enhance mental health literacy. It also links physical health with emotional well-being, stating:

“Health check-ups and growth monitoring that are available in the Anganwadi system shall also be made available to Preparatory Class students of Anganwadi as well as of primary schools.”

“All school children shall undergo regular health check-ups especially for 100% immunization in schools and health cards will be issued to monitor the same” (NEP 2020).

By integrating health monitoring and awareness into schools, the policy supports a holistic understanding of well-being.

4. Support for Children with Special Needs

The policy recognizes the mental health and emotional needs of Children with Special Needs (CWSN). It calls for inclusive education practices, individualized support systems, and appropriate accommodations to ensure their psychological safety and well-being.

5. Capacity Building of Teachers and Staff

NEP 2020 emphasizes strengthening the capacity of teachers and educational personnel to address students' mental health concerns effectively. The policy states:

“Basic training in health, including preventive health, mental health, good nutrition, personal and public hygiene, disaster response and first aid will also be included in the curriculum, as well as scientific explanations of the detrimental and damaging effects of alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs” (NEP 2020).

This ensures that educators are better prepared to guide students toward healthy lifestyles and emotional stability.

6. Integration of Mental Health in Teacher Education Programs

The policy recommends incorporating mental health awareness and psychosocial support strategies into pre-service and in-service teacher training programs. Teachers are expected to identify early signs of stress, anxiety, or depression and provide appropriate support or referrals.

7. Parental Involvement and Community Participation

NEP 2020 highlights the importance of engaging parents and communities in promoting mental well-being. Schools are encouraged to organize awareness programs, workshops, and collaborative initiatives to create a supportive ecosystem for students. Parental engagement helps reinforce emotional support at home and reduces stigma around mental health issues.

SUGGESTIONS FOR STRENGTHENING MENTAL HEALTH CARE UNDER NEP 2020

1. Enhancing Awareness and Sensitization Campaigns

- Develop structured and age-appropriate mental health awareness programs at all educational levels to reduce stigma, myths, and misconceptions.
- Conduct regular workshops, seminars, and interactive sessions involving psychologists, counsellors, teachers, and parents.
- Utilize digital platforms, school websites, and social media campaigns to disseminate accurate information on mental health and well-being.
- Introduce Mental Health Awareness Weeks in schools and colleges to normalize conversations around emotional well-being.

2. Strengthening Counselling Services

- Ensure that every school and higher education institution appoints trained mental health professionals such as counsellors or psychologists.
- Maintain an appropriate student–counsellor ratio to provide individualized attention and confidentiality.
- Implement peer counselling programs where trained students assist their peers under professional supervision.
- Introduce a national-level monitoring and evaluation system to assess the quality and effectiveness of counselling services in institutions.
- Create dedicated “Wellness Rooms” in schools to provide a safe and private space for emotional support.

3. Expanding the Mental Health Curriculum

- Include structured, age-appropriate mental health education in school syllabi to build resilience, coping skills, and emotional intelligence.
- Use innovative teaching strategies such as storytelling, role-playing, case studies, and group discussions to normalize mental health conversations.
- Integrate daily practices such as mindfulness, yoga, breathing exercises, and meditation to reduce stress.

- Incorporate life skills education focusing on self-awareness, empathy, communication, and problem-solving.

4. Providing Tailored Support for Special Needs Students

- Train special educators to identify and address the unique psychological and emotional needs of students with disabilities.
- Establish multidisciplinary intervention teams including counsellors, special educators, and therapists to develop individualized support plans.
- Ensure accessibility to therapy, counselling services, and assistive technologies for students with disabilities.
- Promote inclusive classroom practices that foster belongingness and reduce social isolation.

5. Strengthening Teacher Training on Mental Health

- Make mental health literacy and psychosocial support a mandatory component of pre-service and in-service teacher education programs.
- Equip teachers with practical tools to identify early warning signs of anxiety, depression, bullying, and emotional distress.
- Provide educators with self-care and stress management strategies to prevent burnout.
- Establish teacher support groups within institutions to encourage sharing of experiences and coping mechanisms.

6. Enhancing Parental Involvement and Community Engagement

- Conduct regular parent-teacher meetings focused specifically on students' emotional development and mental well-being.
- Organize awareness sessions for parents on early identification of mental health concerns and supportive parenting practices.
- Encourage collaboration between schools, families, healthcare providers, and local NGOs to create a comprehensive support network.
- Establish community helplines and referral systems for timely mental health assistance.

7. Developing Digital Mental Health Support Systems

- Launch government-backed mobile applications and online portals offering mental health resources, self-help materials, and virtual counselling services.
- Provide free or subsidized tele-counselling services for students in rural and remote areas.
- Integrate AI-based screening tools and digital surveys (with ethical safeguards) to detect early warning signs of distress.
- Ensure strict data privacy and confidentiality standards in digital mental health services.

8. Ensuring Policy Implementation and Sustainability

- Conduct periodic audits and evaluations of school mental health programs to measure outcomes and identify gaps.

- Allocate dedicated funding for mental health initiatives within educational budgets.
- Strengthen coordination between the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Health under initiatives like the National Mental Health Programme (NMHP).
- Develop clear guidelines, accountability frameworks, and reporting mechanisms to ensure long-term sustainability.

The National Education Policy 2020 recognizes the crucial role of mental health in the overall development of students and strongly advocates a holistic approach to emotional and psychological well-being within educational institutions. In this regard, coordination with national initiatives such as the National Mental Health Programme (NMHP) can further strengthen institutional mental health frameworks within the education sector.
