While traditional bridal wear is admired for its richness and craftsmanship, it is often criticized for its excessive weight and bulkiness, which can lead to discomfort and physical strain during extended wedding ceremonies. This research aims to bridge the gap between traditional craftsmanship and modern requirements by exploring innovative design approaches. It focuses on preserving the essence of cultural heritage while integrating lightweight materials, ergonomic construction, and contemporary aesthetics to meet the practical needs of today's bride.

The second phase, Concept Development, involved creating conceptual sketches for three wedding occasions—engagement, sangeet, and wedding—based on insights gathered from surveys and research findings, integrating both traditional and contemporary design elements. The third phase focused on Fabric Sourcing and Testing, where materials were selected based on weight, drape, breathability, and comfort, ensuring suitability for bridal garments. In the fourth phase, Design and Construction, pattern making, draping, stitching, and finishing techniques were executed to develop the final prototypes with attention to detail and craftsmanship. The final phase, Wear Study and Evaluation, assessed the garments in real-life conditions, analyzing fit, comfort, movement, and overall usability during ceremonies. This structured methodology ensured a balance between traditional aesthetics and modern functionality in bridal wear design.

IV. DESIGN AND DEVELOPMENT

The collection, titled “Fusion of Traditional and Modern Elegance,” represents the bride’s journey through three significant wedding occasions, each reflecting a distinct emotional and aesthetic transformation. The first design, the Engagement Outfit, features a sophisticated combination of Royal Cobalt and Silver tones. It is crafted using Zari silk and enhanced with peacock-inspired motifs, creating a regal yet contemporary appeal that signifies the beginning of the bridal journey. The second design, the Sangeet Outfit, is developed in a champagne-gold palette with a mermaid silhouette and a scalloped net cape. This ensemble is designed to offer evening glamour while ensuring high mobility and comfort required for dance-filled celebrations. The third design, the Wedding Outfit, pays homage to traditional heritage through the use of classic red and gold tones in a Kanchipuram silk saree, maintaining cultural authenticity while incorporating styling elements that enhance comfort for long ceremonial hours. Across all three ensembles, designers integrated technical innovations such as 3D embellishments and modular components, including capes as alternatives to traditional dupattas, to reduce garment weight while preserving visual richness and grandeur.

V. RESULT AND DISCUSSION

The research indicates a clear and significant shift in bridal fashion preferences among contemporary consumers. In terms of style preference, 100% of survey respondents indicated a preference for “Traditional with a Modern Touch,” rather than fully traditional or purely minimalist designs, highlighting the strong demand for fusion aesthetics. Regarding fabric and comfort, although 72.7% of respondents still appreciate the visual richness of heavy silk fabrics, an equal percentage identified “comfort and lightweight construction” as the most important factor when selecting bridal outfits, emphasizing a growing prioritization of usability over weight. In relation to color trends, a majority of 72.7% showed preference for pastel shades such as pink and peach over conventional red and gold, reflecting a shift toward softer and more contemporary bridal aesthetics. Furthermore, 86.4% of participants expressed interest in multifunctional garments that can be adapted across multiple wedding functions, indicating a need for versatility in bridal design. Wear test evaluations also demonstrated that the incorporation of lightweight linings and ergonomic tailoring significantly enhanced comfort, mobility, and overall user experience when compared to traditional heavy bridal garments.

VI. CONCLUSION

This project demonstrates that future Hindu bridal wear can successfully integrate traditional aesthetics with modern functionality without compromising cultural identity. By thoughtfully incorporating heritage elements such as Zari work, traditional motifs, and symbolic color palettes into contemporary silhouettes, designers can create bridal ensembles that are both culturally rooted and fashion-forward. The use of lightweight fabrics and innovative construction techniques further supports this evolution, addressing the practical needs of today's brides who seek comfort alongside grandeur.
